The berry-like fruit matures by August-November with a grayish-white colour.

Some butterflies land on Poison ivy, since they are not affected by it. It provides them with a protective place to rest as their predators avoid the plant.

Poison Ivy vines on trees can have a furry "raggy" appearance. These can grow quite large at times, never use them to climb

POISON IVY

Longer
middle stem,
stay away
from them!



This refers to the middle leaflet having a notably longer stem than the two side leaflets.
